By now all Great Lakes Division members should have received a Meet notice for January 25th. Most of these are via email (members who list an email in their TCA profile). It has come to my attention that some of these wind up in a member's spam folder. This is probably because they are sent out in bulk and have attachments. To help alleviate this, add my email <u>nhoj2691@aol.com</u> to your contacts list.

Dealer set up will return to the normal, Friday afternoon 4:00 to 8:00 and Saturday morning 7:00 to 9:00.

GPS and Google Maps show the address we were told to use (#164) as a building at the south end of the fairgrounds, not the two we will be using. Follow the aerial map Charlie provided, and you will have no problem.

You may enter either building first, at their front doors. When you pay, TCA members, family and guests, will receive a name badge, which will allow you entry to both buildings. The public will be given wrist bands.

There is a sidewalk between the buildings, which will allow for quick access from one to the other. This is not via the front doors. You must have your name badge first to use this shortcut.

As always there will be food and drink available. But unlike the UAW Hall, the fairgrounds do not have a proper kitchen in any of their buildings. We have hired a professional food service, with a mobile kitchen, to provide the food, and therefore prices will be a bit higher (but still reasonable). There is a dining area in one of our buildings for you to sit and relax.



Several years ago, I found a listing on e-bay for a Wards Famous Switch Train set. The pictures showed the set box and the train itself (engine, tender, and freight cars). I didn't know anything about this famous set but I liked the looks of the condition of the train so I put in what turned out to be the winning bid and in due course the set arrived.

When I opened the box, I found a cardboard maze which held the train, an overhead crane, transformer, two uncoupling sections, controller for the uncoupling sections and the switches, a left-hand switch, a dead-end bumper, and six straight and 8 curved pieces of track.

There was a place for everything in the cardboard maze and everything was in its place. I pulled the contents out and set things up. It was obvious why Wards called it a switch train set but I thought adding the superlative "Famous" was overdoing it just a bit.

After putting things together, I noticed a small folder at the very bottom of the box. I removed the various cardboard inserts and pulled it out. What it contained was a track plan and a bill of sale.

As you can see, the track plan does not match the box contents. Not only does the plan have two switches and two bumpers but the switches are both right hand as opposed to the single left hand in my set. The track plan also does not indicate the presence of an overhead crane.

I did some internet searching for this set and came up with a number of pictures of different configurations with respect to train consist contents (number and type of cars) as well as to how much and how many additional accessories were part of the set. None of the illustrated sets included a copy of the track plan. What all of them did have in common was the two right-handed switches, the two bumpers and uncoupling track sections, and the overhead crane with the white roof. According to one source the white roof version was unique to the Switch Train set.

As noted, the cardboard inserts in my set box were designed to hold exactly what I had – there is no possible way or empty space to permit the inclusion of an extra switch or dead-end bumper and extra pieces of straight track so everything I had indicated the set was "correct" which, of course, did not explain the difference between my set and the enclosed track plan nor the differences I observed with respect to pictures of other Wards Famous sets on the internet.

It turned out I had the answer to the puzzle all along and it was just a matter of not looking closely at everything. As I noted the second piece of paper was the bill of sale... well not quite. When I took a good look at the "bill of sale" I realized it was no such thing. Instead, it is a notice of necessary changes made in filling the order and the rubber-stamped explanation on the left-hand side states, "(DS) we sent this item as the time before Christmas is so short you might not be able to get a suitable substitute anywhere." Presumably "DS" is short for Dear Sir...but that is only a guess.


Given this shortage of necessary set components for that particular Christmas season, one has to wonder how many other "modified" Wards Famous Switch Train sets were shipped that year to other children waiting for Santa to present them with their first train.




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By 1981 word of my annual showings, which began by accident in 1977, had been passed around the water cooler at work. As a result people would start dropping by my desk in the early part of November, first to ask if I was planning to run trains and then, when I answered in the affirmative, to ask if they could be added to the list of possible visitors.

Close to the end of the third week in December Paul, one of my co-workers, dropped by and asked if it might be possible to bring his son over to see them. His boy was about 6 years old and had been deaf since birth. He mentioned that, at the moment, they were having a very difficult time with him at home with respect to behavior but he assured me he thought he could keep his son under control. Since Paul was built like a tank I figured he could make good on his assurance so we agreed to get together the following evening.


I went home that evening and surveyed the railroad. Just in case there was a problem, I traded a few items with some easy to replace accessories and I moved the MPC gateman up towards the front near the control panel for better visibility. Since his son was deaf I traded out the prewar trains and substituted postwar/MPC engines which were either very colorful or, in the case of steam, up to the job of generating a lot of smoke.

My "show", such as it was, followed the edicts of Frank Ellison. I had read his articles on model railroading and had taken his advice about presenting your railroad much as you would a play. It was for this reason that I wired everything on the railroad for separate control. The script for my "play" usually went something like this:

Welcome guests, get everyone seated, briefly mention my interest in trains and, just so Mom and Dad would have ammunition for the inevitable why-can't-you-get-me-a-train-set-like-this question from the kids, point to various items on the layout and tell the kids about how old I was when I got such-and-such an item. Once the introduction was over I would start a single train on its looping journey. After a couple of turns I would start the second and, depending on the track plan, follow these with the gradual start up of the third. Once all were rolling I would start turning on things - first the lights in the houses, then the block signals, then the crossing gates, then the gateman, etc. With everything going full throttle I would then bring down the lights and let the trains roll in the dark. After running for awhile in the dark I would bring up the lights, bring some of the trains to a halt on one branch of a passing siding, and let the other trains journey around the layout for awhile. After letting all of the "through" trains run I would bring most or all of them to a halt, and turn #1615 loose and let her shuffle operating cars around to the places where they could operate. Once in position I would load/unload or do whatever it was that the cars and accessories did, make up a small train with the switcher, switch some cars into the sidings, and then start all of the trains rolling again. The whole process took anywhere from an hour to an hour and a half.

Paul came over that evening and, after putting their coats in the hall closet, the three of us walked into the living room. At first sight of the living room, Paul gave a sharp intake of breath and quickly reached down and clamped his huge arms around his son, effectively immobilizing his arms and legs. I sat down, looked his son in the eye, and pointed to the train on the outermost loop and started it rolling. Paul picked his son up and cradled him so that his head was down close to the train so his son could get the sensation of having it





every time the gateman popped out, he would give it a little smile.

We ran trains for a little more than an hour. I finished the "show' and invited Paul and his son into the kitchen for some Christcookies and some mas punch. I was just reaching for the cookies when Paul's son reached up and took me by the hand and gently led me back to the living room. He stood for a second and then made a sweeping gesture with his free hand and looked me in the eve. I nodded and sat down in front of the trans-

rush by. Before I started up the second one I again pointed to it and then started it rolling. Paul mentioned that, for the first time ever, his son wasn't squirming. I told him, if he thought everything was ok, we could try just letting his son sit next to me. Paul set his son next to me and positioned himself so that he could grab him if need be - his son didn't move a muscle.

When I reached the point in the "show" where I turned on the gateman (remember, I had changed its position from that in the above picture), I pointed to the house just before the train brought him out. Paul's son was completely entranced at the sight of the man popping out of the shack. I think it is safe to say that never before or since has that accessory had a more appreciative audience. Every time the train would approach he would lean over just a little and watch intently and

formers. Paul's son immediately sat down next to me and gestured once again to the layout. I started everything up and we ran trains. At the end of 3 hours Paul signed to his son that it was time to go. He got up, put on his coat, and, just before he left, he walked back to the living room and gave the Carpet Central a long last look. We never did get to those cookies and punch.

I lost contact with Paul and his family several decades ago. However, every time I set up that gateman I think of his son and I wonder how things turned out for him.

To commemorate our 60th anniversary, the Lake Erie Chapter has decided to produce a Fairport Painesville and Eastern hopper car. This continues our commissioning of cars for the chapter with small local railroads.

The Fairport Painesville and Eastern Railroad was a railroad on the east side of Cleveland, Ohio. It operated from 1910 through 1984, when it was merged with the N&W. Its primary customer was the Diamond Alkali plant in Fairport and later assisted with the building of Perry Nuclear Power Plant. It had connections with the New York Central (PC, Conrail) and the Nickel Plate Road (N&W) east of Painesville in Perry Township and with the B&O in Fairport Harbor / Grand River. Over the course of its existence, the FPE owned seven different 0-6-0 switchers, a mogul, and two consolidations. Later, it owned eight different Alco diesel switchers over time; with varied paint schemes using yellow, green, and black. The last of these is the same paint scheme used by the Ashtabula, Carson, and

Jefferson Railroad, which purchased locomotive 107, formerly NKP 45.

To help support the Diamond Alkali plant, the FP&E maintained a fleet of up to 250 hoppers and 100 gondolas These cars were sent to plants on other rail lines to bring materials to the Diamond Alkali plant. The cars that we are producing are based on the 300 series hoppers bought by FP&E in 1926. These cars were 2 bay 50 ton open hoppers. Most of these were in service until the late 1960s.
